Dear Membership,

This past year has been a year of learning for all of us involved in Literacy: For *students*

We have increased the outreach of our services - Tutors are active in Durham, Hanover, Walkerton, Paisley, Chesley, Mildmay and Port Elgin Public Libraries plus two in-school programs at St. Peter and Paul's and Sullivan Community School. This means many more students gaining knowledge and confidence.

Parents learn how well their students can do and they tell us how much it is appreciated.

Our *Tutors* have benefited from three successful tutor enrichment workshops which were held in the past year.

As *Directors*, we have learned that being a director can bring involvement in undreamed of areas, but that together we can resolve many and varied issues.

We have also learned the importance of a *Treasurer* who can keep a handle on the smallest detail.

Our *Coordinator* has earned our appreciation for her dedication, enthusiasm and organization. She constantly looks for ways to promote our cause, which leads to a higher profile for the organization. Under her leadership our collaboration with Words Aloud Spoken Word Festival and Youth Roots has increased and she regularly makes presentations to schools, Early Years Centres and inter-agency meetings for both Grey and Bruce Counties.

Each year events such as Family Literacy Day, proclaimed in Hanover by Mayor Kathi Maskell on January 27th, increases our community profile. Heightened public awareness of our organization gives us the ability to apply for Private, Foundation and Corporate grants such as Ontario Trillium and United Way Bruce-Grey, which in turn increases our recognition and enables us to reach out to many more students in need.

Last summer we expanded our learning circle to include a co-op student from John Diefenbaker Secondary School and this summer we have once again been given an Ontario Summer Student Experience grant. We will also be assisting Hanover Parks and Recreation Department with their Summer Reading Camp Program.

Currently there are 19 active tutors, but with a waiting list of learners our focus going forward must be on increasing the number of volunteer tutors.

Youth Letter

One Tutor's Experience: Tricks of the Trade

It has been a privilege to tutor a 12-year-old young learner. It took some time to discover which learning tools helped my young learner to advance his reading. I tried this homemade learning game and it succeeded.

My learner picks a book from the library, and passes it to me to ensure that it is suitable. We first skim the book to see if there are any difficult words. If so, we go over these words beforehand and then, when the student feels ready, we read the book. While reading, if the student stumbles on any words, I write them down. When we are finished the book, I go through these words with my young learner.

Before I meet with him the following week, I write each of the difficult words twice, one word on each of two different cue cards. When we do get together, before beginning any other reading, I lay these cards out, face-down. Turning over the cards, we do our best to find two that say the same word. When a match is found the word is put into a sentence by the player that has found the match. After playing this game a couple of times, and learning how the word fits into sentences, we are ready to go on with the lesson.

This is a simple little game that involves interaction with the student, reading, and fun all in one. I have seen an improvement with my young learner since I have begun this learning tool, and hopefully it will help you if you are considering something new for your learner.

Tutor's Toolbag

The idea for this issue's Tutor's Toolbag column comes from a website that provides some excellent advice for youth literacy tutors. The page is called *The Literacy Tutor's Survival Guide*, at

The website is highly recommended. This is their Tutoring Idea # 4.

Tutoring Idea: WRITTEN CONVERSATION

Objective: You and your student are having a conversation on paper. The only reason to speak during this activity is when one of you has a clarifying question to ask.

Why use written conversation? Written conversations encourage your student to practice writing in an engaging way.

It is an activity to get both of you writing which is much more interesting than if the student is the only one writing.

It allows the tutor to make corrections in spelling in a non-intrusive way.

HOW TO DO WRITTEN CONVERSATIONS

- 1. Begin with a blank sheet of paper.
- 2. Tutor writes down an open-ended question.
- 3. Student responds.
- 4. Tutor asks another open-ended question perhaps incorporating words spelled incorrectly by the student in the question.
- 5. Student responds ...and so on and so on.

After the activity, you and your student may want to talk about your written conversation piece.
