Tutor's Tool Bag

We are fortunate to have Darlene Lamb as one of our amazing volunteer tutors. She shares her strategies for honing Fluent Reading with young learners. She combines lots of great teaching expertise and fun into her learning sessions. Utilizing a simple tape recorder, her young learner tapes himself reading a passage and upon rewinding and listening, learns firsthand how to heighten the enthusiasm and add spark to his reading aloud. Truth be told, he has also been known to read in the voice of Elvis Presley!

Wow, what is that I hear? Why, it's fluent reading! It sounds like someone having a conversation with a friend.

Here are a few strategies that have helped my young reader make gains in his reading level and comprehension too. Our goal is to have the reading sound like natural speech. Where text is being read silently or aloud, much of its meaning comes from the way it sounds. Students who read with expression are able to segment text into meaningful units, marking phrase and sentence boundaries with pauses, vowel lengthening and changes in pitch and emphasis. The result is improved comprehension.

Each session we increase our **sight words** by reading words on small cards. We read small **phrases** of words on small strips to develop fluency. The goal is to always keep it sounding smooth.

Auditory modeling may be the most

powerful technique for developing the rhythms and tones of spoken language while reading. This leads to improved understanding.

Echo reading: reading aloud phrase by phrase, slightly after a live (that's the tutor) or a taped model. Choral (group), shared and partner reading are also examples of auditory modeling.

Re-reading familiar material allows the student to learn to be a reader putting his/her very complex recall and sequencing behaviour into practice.

Recording the selection on a tape recorder allows the student to be a performer and hear him/herself when the selection is played back. With greater fluency, readers can concentrate on comprehending what they read, develop greater self-confidence, and enjoy reading more. Increasing the chances for a successful reading experience is the goal.

"One of my favourite reads as a child was Macbeth (yes, Shakespeare's). My mom and a couple of her friends gathered in the living room to read the different parts. I was allowed to stay up late and read the part of the three witches. I must have been around 6 years old. I loved the feel of these words in my mouth:

The Letter H

Double, double toil and trouble; Fire burn, and cauldron bubble. Fillet of a fenny snake, In the cauldron boil and bake; Eye of newt, and toe of frog . . .

I may not have understood the play itself, but I loved the drama and the rhythm and richness of the language.

What I realized much later is that reading great literature to kids can be inspiring. It doesn't always have to be a kid's book. Or even great literature. Just look around the house. Maybe your favourite recipe. An article from the newspaper. A poem that moves you. If you, as the adult reader, love it, that love and passion will rub off on your children. Letting them stay up past their bedtime, with reading as the treat, isn't a bad idea either."

Murray Howard is a lifelong learner and friend of Youth Literacy. He contributes to the community by holding weekly read-aloud sessions for the senior residents at Rockway Terrace in Durham. The sharing of reading is an all ages event!

Millennia Book Store


